Resource Recovery beats incineration



Resource Recovery Centres (RRCs) beat incinerators as a solution for waste in every way: they create way more jobs while serving communities and keeping profits local. They don't pollute & are cheaper to build and maintain.

- A proposed Incinerator in Te Awamutu is estimated to cost \$200 million. By comparison, a small RRC can be started for \$500,000 and a medium sized RRC costs around \$2 million.
- For every 10,000 tonnes of waste, an incinerator creates one job; a landfill creates 6, recycling creates 36 and reuse activities a whooping 296 jobs.²
- In areas with RRCs, recycling rates for households increase significantly because it easier and more convenient for people to recycle and reuse materials.³
- Incinerator profits will go overseas to pay off the huge debt and interest. RRCs are owned by the community, so the profits stay in the community for the community.
- In 2022, New Zealand's recycling and RRC's helped to divert 28% of materials away from landfill.⁴

- 40-50% of landfill waste is building and construction material.⁵ With incineration, disposal of this toxic material is at risk of being burnt, releasing compounds such as arsenic and heavy metals in toxic ash and emissions. MDF board, Melamine/Formica, painted or stained wood can also be mixed in with wood waste and should not be burned.
- Resource recovery centres engage with more than 100,000 community members every year, providing education and raising awareness about waste minimisation and sustainable practices.
